
London Town

Another trip down to London for the game v Italy saw us having a night out very close to Kings Cross ready for the trip home and that place was Camden Town. Some of what we saw makes interesting reading. When I asked Mum as a child, 'how expensive is London?' she replied; 'Some things cost a lot more, and some things a lot less!' and I couldn't put it any better myself all these years later. We were in the World's End pub opposite the station but it was half empty and at over £7 a pint can you be surprised! We had the only real ale for sale (but from a tap) and service made a mess of it and we couldn't hear ourselves think – time to move on.

The Camden Road Arms was a sparsely attended Brewdog pub and even when the beer was 'on' and not 'off' it was still pretty poor tasteless stuff while the cider was worse with mate Larry's cider being so sharp as to leave his pint there and if you knew Larry, well....

On to the Devonshire Arms, a dark goth pub with a Battle of the Goth Bands at one end and apparently, we are all going to die several times over and each time will be nastier than the previous death! It was rammed but there was no bitter on, just the Beavertown Neck Oil (Satan's blood anyone?) a bit of a favourite for me. At least the place was alive only this time they all wanted to be dead; there really is no pleasing some people!

Time for one more back near the station, the Camden Eye is on the pointy end between two streets and affords 150-degree panoramic view. No music, some real ale and staff pleased to see you (well Ok, the barmaids fancied Arron but I'll ride on anyone's good fortune) and we could all sit together and sup some ale. Alas there they were, the only two hand pumps we'd seen in 4 pubs. In the middle of the bar though was a fat horizontal chrome tube though with all the 'pump clips' on it from left to right announcing that they were all beers, a sight to gladden my heart you'd think.





Beavertown and Brixton beers were on each tap and a word with the bar manager revealed all; 'These new chilled beers are all the rage, the younger customers love them. They aren't interested in real ale in itself; this is what they want'.

I'm glad we tried the pubs in that order as luck happens, I'm optimistic that if ale can't win here, the pressure on sales by not just ale but also stout, cider, porter and now these modern chilled beers is at least doing the same and damaging the real enemy of the taste buds; tasteless lager.

The Tale End; The lumps of Ol' Tolly Cobbold

Who recalls one of the big 'lewkel' players back in the last century? Tolly Cobbold of Ipswich wasn't a bad drop when served well but all too often it just wouldn't be right, in some ways it was the beer that turned everyone to lager after Watney's Red Barrel had got the ball rolling. The brewery was near to Ipswich Docks but on reflection the brewery should — perhaps have been IN the Dock for its beer after all, why leave people thinking they might dislike it when you can make them pay for a pint to prove it! The problem with Tolly Original was the view.

The VIEW you say! Well, yes. You see Tolly Cobbold beer always had little lumps of a yellow 'cheese like' substance in the bottom of your glass. A light yellow in colour and 2-3mm across they could look like a chipped tooth. You always left 2-3mm of your Tolly best bitter in the bottom when drinking, keeping an eye on the bottom of your glass as your pint disappeared.

Slip sideways for a moment in time to a foolish moment of mine (stick around, I have plenty), when I helped

form the Cambridge League of Gentlemen based out of The Green Man in Grantchester, then a local favourite of Stavros Loadsamoney. This was the time of Maggie T and Harry Enfield's 'Loadsa money' and extravagant spending. Our first trip at the CLG was a coach trip to the Tolly Brewery one mid-week evening and the big talk was of whether even the brewery tap room would have 'the lumps' but most agreed this was just in-tolly-rable (sorry!) and that any right-minded pub let alone the much-fabled Tap Room would never have them and it was perhaps just the unlucky 30 pubs that we all knew that had them (without exception) – and just bad luck right?



After a tour of the brewery during which all we could think about was the tap room, we all keenly awaited our lump-less beer and sandwiches and so we finally entered the mythical 'brewery tap room' and there, our guide introduced us to 'Fred and Bert' who had 171 years of experience - each! - and they began pouring beer, the real stuff — you know, lump-less! When our beers were passed over there it was in all its majesty, the golden pint we'd waited for and in the bottom of everyone's glasses; more lumps than we'd ever seen!
